
Vista 29: Community Details

- 80 apartment units
 - 77 studios and 3 one-bedrooms
 - 1 night monitor unit
- 12 fully accessible units and 2 units for individuals with sensory impairments
- Kitchenette with full size appliances and full bathroom
- 60% AMI or less
- 62 rental subsidies
 - 42 PBVs administered by ACOH
 - 20 Section 811s administered by Virginia Housing
- Extensive security system
- Off-street parking
- Community room
- Computer room
- Fitness room
- Laundry facilities
- Front desk, staffed 16 hours a day
- Staff offices for on-site property management and supportive services staff
- EarthCraft Certified with roof mounted solar panels

Phase 1: Vista 29

Construction: January/February 2025 – December 2026 Pre-Leasing: Summer 2026 Certificate of Occupancy: December 2026 Fully Leased: Early 2027

Phase 2: Piedmont Housing Alliance Begin pre-development: 2027

Vista 29 brings us one step closer to ending chronic homelessness in Albemarle County and the City of Charlottesville.
